JANUARY 2017



EVENT: National Voters Day

DATE: 25th January 2017

National Service Scheme of Kamala Nehru College held an oath taking ceremony on the campus grounds. The participants swore to uphold the **dignity, democratic and peaceful process of elections in India**, and do their part in selection of representatives.

MARCH 2017

EVENT: World Water Day

DATE: 22nd March 2017

World Water Day focuses on the importance of universal access to clean water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) facilities in developing countries. The day also focuses on advocating for the sustainable management of freshwater resources. Water is a limited resource. What each of us does in the world, how we live, does make a difference. As we learn the value of clean, safe water and how scarce it truly is, we can take steps to protect it and to get it to people who lack access today. So to spread awareness and take some action, we conducted a pledge ceremony, followed by a rally. The pledge consisted of taking an oath to conserve water judiciously. The volunteers, then, rallied around the college to aware students about World Water Day through posters and slogans.



JUNE 2017



EVENT: International Yoga Day

DATE: 21st June 2017

A one hour yoga session was held in the morning at 6:30 am which was followed by Sankalp and National anthem. After this our speaker for the event Mrs. Seema Kaushik gave a lecture on the importance of yoga in our daily life. The event ended with serenity and relaxation in the mind and body of all the volunteers and teachers.

EVENT: International Day against Drug Abuse

DATE: 26th June 2017

We were invited for the seminar on "International Day against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking" at the PhD Chamber of Commerce. 13 NSS volunteers (including two members of the Core Team) represented KNC along with two society convenors – Mr. Hari Ram Prajapati and Mr. Manoj Malhar. The chief guests of the event were – Dr. Jitendra Nagpal - a Senior Consultant Psychiatrist and in-charge of the Institute of Child Development and Adolescent Health at Moolchand Medcity, New Delhi, and Mrs. Neetu Sharma – the Executive Director of the Navjyoti India Foundation and the Joint Commissioner of Police. Each of the three chief guests gave informative and motivational speeches on how to detect and protect someone who is under the influence of drug or any other substance abuse so that they can lead a happy and risk-free life. Everyone agreed that substance abuse is nothing but a behavioural disorder that must be detected early before it is too late. They also discussed the possible reasons for indulging in substance abuse, it could be – peer pressure, failure in life, broken families, or merely just curiosity. Signs of drug abuse along with ways for parents, teachers and peers to deal with people under this life- threatening influence. An excellent play was also put up by 'The Color Bakery' theatre group of New Delhi, sensitizing the audience on the issue with fine clarity.

JULY 2017





EVENT: Sanitation and Health Awareness Drive in Begumpur

DATE: 7th July 2017

We visited the slum and interacted with the residents, enquiring about the cleanliness of the locality and their awareness regarding hygiene practices. Questionnaires were administered to the residents, primarily pertaining to the Swachh Bharat Abhiyan and its overall effectiveness. The people reported that while good in theory and shows promise, it has not been carried out to its full potential and thus, has not been especially successful. They gradually opened up and shared their daily hygiene woes, saying that despite personal effort and initiative, the officials responsible never carried out their responsibilities diligently and showed a lax and laid back attitude regarding routine cleaning and sanitation. Common complaints were waterlogged sewers, sewers overflowing, MCD dustbins not being cleared out regularly and mosquito breeding. It was also found that the government had not been successful in raising awareness regarding sanitary measures, such as the distinction between bio-degradable and non biodegradable waste and the allotted dustbins same. In spite of government callousness, the residents are very efficient by themselves and take care of their own. Majority of the residents throw their domestic waste in a dustbin by the house and dispose it off of in the MCD dustbin outside their slum. Shopkeepers also take measures to not have people litter their surroundings after buying from them. Toilets are a problem for some people. Personal toilets are available only to the people who had the space to construct the same. Others continue to use public restrooms.

Even though the people of **Begumpur village** live in poverty, they are highly responsive and are very willing to work towards a better community for themselves, and while help would be appreciated, they are capable of taking matters into their own hands and creating a cleaner environment only if resources are provided to them.

EVENT: Electoral Enrollment Drive

DATE: 27th - 28th July 2017

The **Electoral Enrollment Drive** commenced with an introductory session given to us by **Ms. Nisha, the D.E.O of AC-42 Kasturba Nagar**. We were briefed about the reason, and importance of the drive and how to fill the form. We were also informed about the regions that come under our jurisdiction. After the briefing session, we drafted a notice, copies of which were put up in the college campus along with the posters provided to us by the DC Office. The NCC/NSS Team also released an online notice which was spread across all social media platforms, in order to ensure that all the students of the college knew about the drive. We received around 20-30 enquiries and we advised all the underage applicants to apply in the next camp.

AUGUST 2017

EVENT: Swachhta Hi Sewa

DATE: 2nd -15th August 2017

The NSS Society of Kamala Nehru College celebrated "Swachhta Hi Sewa" on the occasion of Swachh Bharat from 2nd Aug. to 15th Aug. 2017. We took a pledge to observe and be a part of hygiene and cleanliness in all aspects of daily life, and to sensitize others also. Cleaning our college campus on regular basis is a part of our society. Our volunteers started an awareness campaign about the difference between Biodegradable and Non-bio-degradable wastes in the college campus. The volunteers cleaned up classrooms, corridors, Chaupal, canteen area and the college surroundings. The need to save electricity is also dire and we posted notices regarding such in each classroom.

National service scheme is a traverse to serve in a way, starting from your own doorsteps. Our college in the same way is providing the platform in promoting various community service programmes for a better world i.e. what surrounds us, 'our abode". Swachhta is one of the basics in our NSS routine and is portrayed amongst our youth significantly. Usually we used to do cleanliness drives spreading awareness about "keep it green ...keep it clean", but this year under the 'Swachhta Pakhwara' campaign, it started with a new essence, giving us responsibility and rearranging the distorted sections of our classrooms, corridors and washrooms. Our drives initiated from 2nd august where we organised a cleanliness drive allotting each group of volunteers a room to clean. On 3rd august we conducted the oath ceremony where our programme officer took the oath asking every student to abide by it. On 4th of august we continued with our drives within the campus and students participated very actively. On 5th of august we initiated a 3 hours long drive in which we not only cleaned the college but also came up with a message to save electricity and made students realise responsibility towards college. The 4 day event turned out to be a huge success inculcating in students a responsible behavior towards a clean institution eventually leading to a clean nation.



7th Aug. - Rally to Masjid Moth area, Gautam Nagar, Niti Bagh

We interacted with the people around the Masjid Mor, taking their views on a green and clean India.

A man working at a nearby vegetable shop spoke to us about the fact that he would like to support the project but at the moment he does not make an active effort to do so. We informed him about how he could separate his bio-degradable and non bio-degradable waste.



 $8^{th \&} 9^{th}$ Aug.-Begumpur visit

It's so strange that a place just a few kilometres from our college seems like a completely different world. When we went for a survey for 'The Clean India Mission' to 'Begumpur Slums' we were astonished to see the condition in which the people are living. Sights such as dirty stagnant water, clogged drains, narrow lanes, cramped houses and heaps of garbage welcomed us. Seeing us (maybe we seemed as strange to them as they seemed to us), the residents gathered all around us telling us about their grievances. We tried telling them that we are just a bunch of students who are here for a survey regarding The Clean India Mission.

When we talked to people we were shocked to know that most of the women didn't know about the 'Swachh Bharat Abhiyan'. These were the major problem they told us, first of all the garbage. We could see garbage dumped everywhere. The dumped waste emanate foul odour and at the same time becomes breeding ground for flies and mosquitoes which carry several diseases with them. Also children were playing near the garbage dumps oblivious of the fact that they may get infected with some fatal disease. Water! A major problem they talked about was of water. Being the rainy season there was standing water everywhere. People told that they don't have toilets at their homes so they have to use public toilet of their area. The toilet there was in pathetic conditions. There were cramped houses. It's difficult to even imagine the living conditions of the houses there unless and until you actually experience this nightmare. Six to eight people share a cramped room and only they know as to how so many people fit in such a small room. Also they told us that the municipal dustbin of their area is never cleaned the garbage is thrown on the roads. The streets are narrow and the sewage water stagnates in open surface drains, which emits very bad smell. Seeing small kids living in those conditions was heart breaking. Just a few hours in those slums made me feel suffocated. Imagine people spending their whole lives there. We may have criticised Slumdog Millionaire, a lot about how it showed just the bad side of India, but aren't we just trying to cover the reality that the bad side does exist? Slum development needs to work on a better level. It's clear that The Clean India Mission is a failure over there.



EVENT: Visit to GOONJ

DATE: 12th August 2017

Goonj works basically for the relief of

people during the time of disasters. Around 61 students along with the program officer (NSS) of our college went to the processing centre of the NGO and were given information about all the work that this NGO does. Goonj works especially in the flood prone areas and also for the rural dwellers, urban people who are economically backward and spreads awareness about the need of cloth, taboos related to menstruation etc. The Organization is working through various programmes and campaigns such as Raahat, Not just a piece of cloth, waapsi, etc. We also got a chance to meet the founder of Goonj Mr. Anshu Gupta who inspired us and asked us that whatever changes you can make just make it. The visit reaffirmed our ideas on public and social welfare and doing Good to others.

EVENT: Lecture on Cleanliness by Dr KK Roul

DATE: 10th August 2017

Dr. Roul, in light of the hon'ble Prime Minister's address to nation on the same issue in the Lok Sabha, decided to bring the debate on the state of India's sanitation practices within the academic sphere and create better awareness around the matter. Students took a pledge to work towards the true development of the country. The dais was then taken over by Dr. Roul who emphasized the need for immediate action to be taken to alleviate India's position from ranking at a shameful 155th in the world's list of cleanest countries which included 178 nations in total. He explained the socio-economic as well as cultural reasons behind India's poor performance and stated that although Indian people as a whole are quite particular about personal sanitation and hygiene, we must work towards broadening our perspective and extending these principles of sanitation to our surroundings as well. He also cited the various schemes undertaken by the government, the Swachh Bharat Mission being prominent among them. The talk was, thus, helpful in making the students to realize the need for public hygiene and improved their resolve to aid the government in its attempts to secure a cleaner and brighter future for the nation.



EVENT: Independence Day Celebration DATE: 14th August 2017

Our **Principal Dr. Kalpana Bhakuni** gave a speech on Swachhta and **declared our institution as Clean Institution**. She inspired our students not only to make clean their surroundings only; but also to take care of the country as a good and responsible citizen.



EVENT: Cancer Awareness Program by Rajiv Gandhi Cancer Institute and Research Centre (RGCIRC).

DATE: 31st August 2017

A lecture was held on the topic "What every woman needs to know about Breast and Cervical Cancers?" by Dr. Consultant. Aggarwal, Sr Indu **RGCIRC, Rohini**. A team of 4 members of the special cell came for this program. They discussed about the causes, symptoms and the primary remedies of the diseases. Students even shared their experiences in the end of the lecture. The lecture was very informative.

IT ISN'T A GARBAGE STORE



We are not in it for income, we are in it for outcome"

Welfare services intend to aid disadvantaged, distressed and vulnerable persons who are victims of any kind of physical, mental and emotional atrocities. In India, there are countless number of non-profit organisations working for their overall well-being and enhancement of their social functioning.

We all have come across different types of donation drives for sure. Many of us have even participated in this noble cause. But, these days it is evident that the word "DONATION" in itself is misinterpretated. This statement can be proved through this given example - GOONJ, an award winning social enterprise works for the rural communities in the rural areas ,it provides people their basic needs and requirements such as clothing, domestic tools, sanitary pads etc. Their aim is to bring development in the rural areas along with those of urban areas. However, in a recent drive the donations they received weren't generous, but absolutely heartless. The fact became evident when the organisation shared the pictures of contribution they received. These were the things that a sweeper won't even touch. From blood - stained under garments to rotten food and broken utensils, the "CONTRIBUTION" offered was disgusting. Through its Facebook post the organisation wanted to send the message that It Is Not A Garbage Store and such contributions not only demean the volunteers but also the recipients. This wasn't a full stop of the heartless practices of people on the grounds of donations. For urban class people, donations are a way to rush the garbage out of their houses. People should realise the importance and ambiguity of "CONTRIBUTION" and make it as efficient as possible.

Effective contribution is essential in the key areas of social service. For instance, especially abled should be provided with the opportunities so that they can reach their potential and can be included in the community. Second, people suffering from mental health disorders should be assisted in their recovery journey. Third, senior citizens should be enabled to stay healthy and socially engaged. We must also help children and youth to provide them with the skills they need to overcome the challenges of life.

Blood and Religion



During a session, a little girl in blue stood up with little shyness and frankness as whatever she would ask will be logical. She asked me," Ma'am, do all women bleed and bleed with red colour?

As it was so obvious I answered positively with little bit knowledge of why blood looks red- Haemoglobin.

I knew it that these kids of small age ask such questions that would be so easier to answer because I have already taken three such workshops on menstruation. Then she asked with some fine lines on her forehead .The lines of dilemma and dizziness.

"Do women of all the religion bleed? And Muslim women too?"

I knew it; to again reply in affirmation but this time her question left me with another question. Do these kids really understand religion and what does that remark "Muslim women too" mean?

We as people has inherited religion so deep that our progeny trying to find out relation between things made by humans and natural process.

"Menstruation has no relation with any religion it is as natural as inhalation, exaltation, excretion, digestion, blinking of eyes, thumping of hearts, birth of a baby and existence of this universe." The word "universe" in the end of my reply satisfied me. With great relief I felt that I have taught something so real to her. As real as menstruation.

(Above is an anecdote. I worked with Womenite, a social organisation works for gender and sexual identity. I used to take workshops on menstrual education with small school going kids.)

In a civilised society in which human rights, social justice and democracy are conceived of as vital values and standards social workers support people who are not able to fulfil their basic and secondary needs. Social work contributes to the quality of life of all citizens, social cohesion and solidarity. Social service is no doubt necessary, for man does not live for himself but for the society to which he belongs.

Unfortunately, we seldom think of others – A society may suffer from the absence of welfare clinics, no opportunity for elementary education, lack of sanitation and much more. The problem is particularly pressing in a country like ours where forty percent live below poverty line. Every able-bodied citizen should be compelled to devote a part of his time for the good of the community. This will have a liberalising and cementing influence. Social work can be a means of achieving emotional integration in the country. From the perspective of a social worker certain ethics need to be a followed. Partnership should be promoted in several ways such as keeping an open dialogue between professionals and service users. Being honest about the differences of opinion and information that helps to promote their understanding

Another striking issue was that of independence. People with disability require a lot of help and were dependent on the care taker. The aim should be to make them as independent as possible.

However, there are certain aspects to be developed within the organisation of the social service. I encourage each one of us today to relate to the most positive consequences of social work. It has been a major boost in self development and intellectual growth. It seems to be about other people but you will feel the reward from daily involvement. The greatest satisfaction is the gratitude expressed from society and the feelings that you are the one people turn to in case of help and support.

A MAGICAL EXPERIENCE

There are many experiences in life that leave a deep impact within ourselves, my 11 day community service in "Kechla" a small Naxalite village in Orissa can be considered as one of those memorable remarkable experiences of my life that I truly hold dear .Kechla is a conglomeration of several hamlets of primarily tribal populace spread over quite a wide region. The area was so backward that essential infrastructure that is required to lead a basic life was non-existent, thus no proper roads, no electricity, no potable water, no school, nor any healthcare facility whatsoever existed in region.Auro-Mira Service Society decided to work in the village as its field of karmayoga, a necessary component part of the Integral Yoga sadhana of Sri Aurobindo and the The Auro-Mira Mother. VidyaMandir, where I volunteered as a teacher, was set up in 2004-05 by Auro-Mira Service Society (AMSS). When the AMSS first decided to work in this region, it was a challenging task as the basic infrastructure required to build in that tiny region was non existence .However through several efforts and challenges the AURO MIRA VIDYA MANDIR in July 2008 was set up.

The institution follows a free progress system of education, favouring practical knowledge and learning as

suited to each student over rote learning and memorization, or simply bookish education. There are no exams or tests; instead the children learn to imbibe their learning without incentive, learning freedom responsibility together. Volunteering as a teacher in Kechla taught me many lessons; it was more than a student teacher experience that I gained from the trip. Other than setting tasks and lessons for the 2 students (Damru and Mohan) that I was assigned I did so much more in that surreal place. From performing activities like shramdham to training children, visiting the reservoir and going for trecks and star gazing with the children everyday made my experience of Kechla even more enriching. Teaching my students was not a simple task there were one or two days where we were not able to complete the set tasks. The process was often slow. However these small situations taught me much more than one can think of, I learned how to deal with different people in different situations and how to be patient. Most importantly I learned how to be satisfied and grateful in what life has given me and how we take things for granted that some children long to have. The unprivileged children found happiness in the smallest of things, their enthusiasm to learn new things each day and their dedication to hostel

work as well as studying taught me so much.

Personally, I felt that the significance of community service wasn't only limited to the education we gave the children but the values we gained from the children there. My personal experience of community service-Shramdhaan, in Kechla was enriching

and unforgettable. In spite of the hectic schedule in Kechla where our days were packed with activities, from shramdaan at 6:30 in the morning, to school from 9:30 to 3, generally followed by some sort of activity, there was a sense of calmness everywhere. It was truly an inspiring and unique experience that has had such an impact on my life.

Because,


What good will that do, of letting you hold me when I need to be told to pick up the dagger myself?

Is religion really the reason for social exclusion?

The 21st century, where ISIS is causing unrest in the world in name of the caliphate, media is reporting about cow vigilantes, or about the Ayodhya conflict, one can't help but wonder whether religion is the demon eating away any hope for social inclusion and peace. We blame terrorism on Islam, cow vigilant and Dalit oppression on Hinduism and some anti Semitics blame class divide and World War 1 on Jews. The result is xenophobia. Xenophobia especially Islamophobia is quite prevalent in various parts of the world. This is quite apparent through the travel ban by US President Donald Trump or Syrian refugees being refused by Germany or the hijab ban by France. The rationale behind these decisions is simply this: "All Muslims are terrorists". A surge in neo Nazism is also being observed with the growing popularity of Alternative Rights of the speech on social networks like Pewdiepie, a YouTube sensation propagating Anti Semitics views. These neo Nazi views blame Jews for the class unites and also for the World War 1.

The real question that prises after observing all this intolerance towards one religion by people belonging to other religions is whether or not is it justified to blame religion for all bad things that happen in the world or is the source something else? Are we ostracizing these gions we so openly criticize? Do the people who criticize these religion real address and what religion stands for? Are we pointing fingers just at a particular angion and turning a blind eve to everything else? To be able to answer the questions one must first realize what religion is. Religion is a belief in existence of a Supreme authority I.e. the God or a Guru. Religion is an ideology that tells its followers how to differentiate between good and evil, right and wrong etc. Religion is never restricted to a practitioners for it is a structure conducive of faith where people can come together to believe in the ideology that led to the genesis of the religion.

But what is the definition of religion from the point of view of the people who believe in ideas like "All Muslims are terrorists"? They have restricted the idea of religion to its few practitioners who are causing unrest in society. Because of a few Muslims who are a part of ISIS or Taliban, people have formed a generalized image of Islam. They have stopped seeing Islam as a practice or a faith and have started seeing it as a crime. Religious intolerance has reached its peak and hate crimes against the Muslims have increased exponentially. It has become a norm to subject any person with his surname as Khan to more scrutiny. There are various examples like Shahrukh Khan being subjected to stricter vetting processes at airport security checks. What people need to understand is that no religion is born hating another. No religion demands the annihilation of another religion. Quran doesn't give the message of hatred and innocent bloodshed. Yet every Muslim is looked at with eyes filled with suspicion. People who proclaim that all Muslims are terrorists need to sit back and think over the consequences of their actions and justify this statement.

They need to realize that the real hurdles in social inclusivity is when they attach the tag of Osama to all Muslims.

It is also problematic how religion is often thought to be the reason why social exclusion is coming about. Hinduism as a religion is being blamed for cow vigilantism and suppression and exclusion of the Dalits. We are blaming Hinduism as a religion for creating class divides yet in reality we are forgetting that it is again the fault of select few practitioners who support and promote the idea of untouchables. We see in Hindu scriptures like Ramayana showing Rama eating berries offered and bitten by Shabri. The clear lesson from this is story is that equal respect need to be given to all regardless of their caste. Yet there are people who say they believe in Ramayana yet propagate the idea of oppressing Dalit community for personal selfish motives. There is a need to realize that it is not Hinduism I.e. the religion that is the real culprit but the Hindus who believe in untouchability. These people have created hierarchies and have tried to incorporate these into their religions and hence have successfully transferred the blame to religion.

Also there are issues regarding conflicts among various religions. When ideas like Hinduism as a religion is thought to be antithetical to Islam is when communal riots take place. Though neither of their scriptures say so, yet the practitioners of the religion believe and propagate such views. There have been numerous riots among the Hindus and Muslims like the Bombay riots, Godiva riots and the fight over Babri Masjid. There has been an extreme polarization between the communities so much so that there was the partition of India. This kind of polarization has left many Muslims in India, which is a Hindu majoritarian population with little agency. Though their religion aren't antithetical to each other yet the binary exists. The reasons for this binary us perhaps the reason for all conflicts: It's a fight for dominance. People have a superiority complex that they have the psychological need to appease. They feel their religion is superior to other, that their God is Supreme and that is why the problem exists. The reason for any kind of ostracization or social exclusion is this superiority complex itself. Why are people against homosexuality is perhaps they believe that heterosexual is superior to homosexuality. These people then fight for dominance in the name of religion and violate religious values. Innocent bloodshed is not what any religion propagates yet ISIS carry out killings and bombs places in the name of religion. Hindus do the same with cow vigilantism portraying it as protection of religious values. Religion itself isn't the preparator of religious crimes. It is rather the practitioners with superiority complexes who go ahead and indulge in it. Hence, religion isn't the black sheep of the society. It is the people themselves. To bring about social inclusion, it is important to get rid of this feeling of or need for superiority. Social inclusion, though not a utopia, isn't an easily fulfilled reality.

In recent times, having heard and read of various cases of rapes, acid stacks, trafficking it seemed easy to lose hope that it would ever be easy being a woman in a society like this. One such day, I came across the story of Haseena Hussain. She is an acid attack victim and her story

also started with a 'No ' that the receiver couldn't quite respect. In her case it was her boss who threw a jug full of acid on her face when she rejected his proposal of marriage. She was rushed to MS Ramaya Hospital where the doctors refused to operate unless they were to receive Rs. 100,000 in advance. After that she was transferred to a government hospital where she received medical attention after 3 days of intense pain. By then the infection had spread rendering her body 70% burned. She underwent 35 surgeries, lives on a liquid diet, her parents had to sell off their house to pay



for her medical bills and yet her problems were far from over. To add on to the emotional trauma, her boss who was imprisoned after 5 years, given a sentence of 5 years 2 months was released within 2 months of prison. Even though the justice system failed her, she persevered for justice. She raised her voice which forced the government to extend the sentence to a life imprisonment.

Having suffered through great pain, she started to recover from her trauma with the help of her parents. She decided to give her life a new direction and associated herself with Enable India, an institution for visually impaired people. Here she learned computer and other skills . Because of her continued effort , she is now a stenographer in a government department and is now the sole bread winner for her family. Not only did she become financially independent, she also became part of various NGOs engaged in helping acid attack victims. She is a part an NGO called 'Make Love Not Scars where she talks to other victims and inspire them to not give up their lives. She has been an inspiration to numerous women.

Her story is that of a brave woman, who rebuilt herself from the ashes of a tragedy, which may have scarred her skin, but couldn't kill her spirit. One can't help but applaud her tremendous strength and bravery.

I am who I am


They might call me a weak woman

Which is why I choose to be me, to be who I really am...


I'm misunderstood and I'm considered useless My feelings are hurt, my body isn't respected But I'm stronger than others. I am more than me..
